FROM THE TOP OF THE PODIUM

We caught up with U.S. vaulter Kimmy Palmer to talk about her amazing bronze medal finish at the FEI Vaulting World Cup™ Final 2022 Leipzig in Germany and what she's looking forward to most about potentially competing in Omaha.

Of all your top performances, what stands out about earning the bronze medal at the FEI Vaulting World Cup™ Final 2022 Leipzig?

This competition was so special for me. Taking the bronze was unexpected. It helped set the tone for the year and boost my confidence. I feel like I became a new vaulter after the World Cup in 2022.

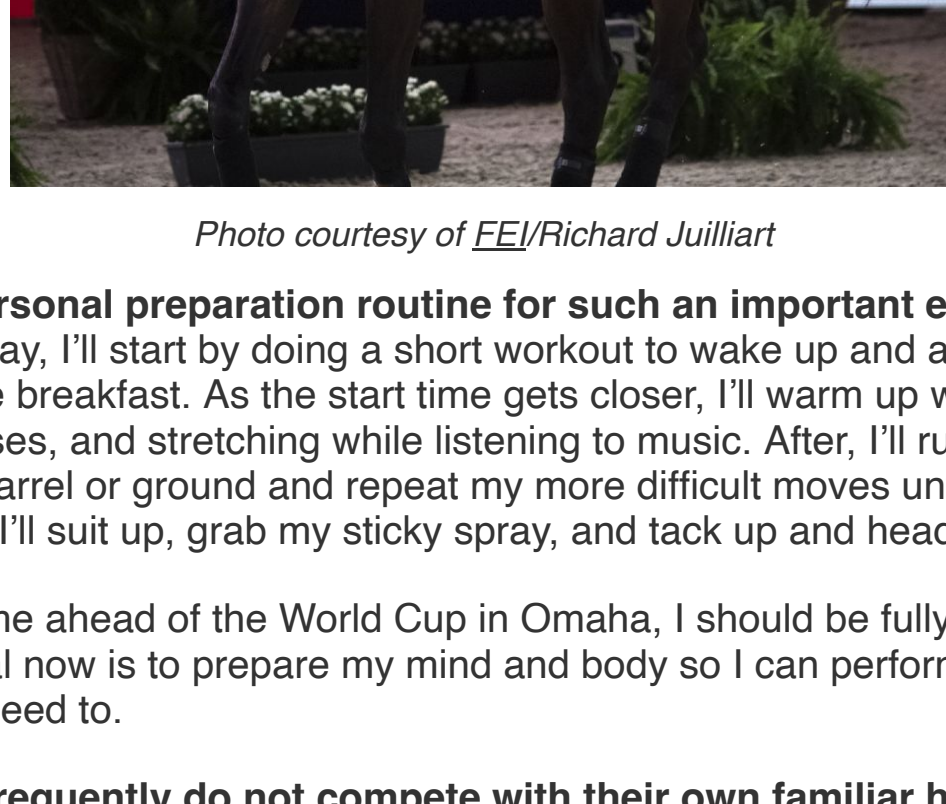

What is your personal preparation routine for such an important event?

On competition day, I'll start by doing a short workout to wake up and activate my body, followed by some breakfast. As the start time gets closer, I'll warm up with some running, balancing exercises, and stretching while listening to music. After, I'll run through my routines on the barrel or ground and repeat my more difficult moves until I feel confident and ready. Next, I'll suit up, grab my sticky spray, and tack up and head to the arena!

At this point in time ahead of the World Cup in Omaha, I should be fully fit and ready to compete. My goal now is to prepare my mind and body so I can perform my routine at the exact time I need to.

Since vaulters frequently do not compete with their own familiar horses at championships, what is the hardest part of practicing and competing with different horses?

Adapting to their height and movement is challenging. The second biggest challenge is not knowing how a particular horse competes. For example, if they become faster, come into the circle, and so on. Working with different horses is a learning experience. It's definitely very helpful to compete on a borrowed horse at a smaller competition before the important one.

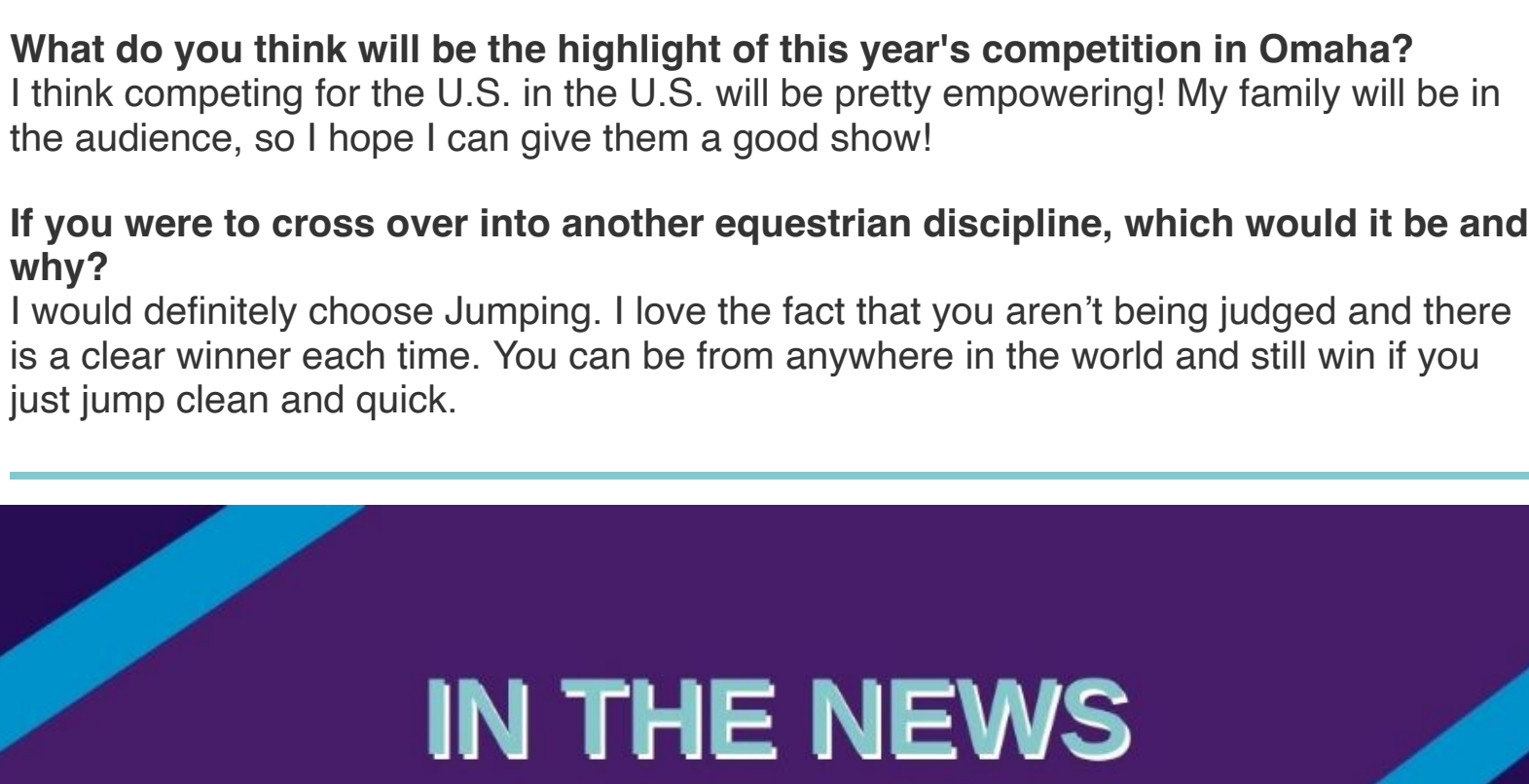

What do you think will be the highlight of this year's competition in Omaha?

I think competing for the U.S. in the U.S. will be pretty empowering! My family will be in the audience, so I hope I can give them a good show!

If you were to cross over into another equestrian discipline, which would it be and why?

I would definitely choose Jumping. I love the fact that you aren't being judged and there is a clear winner each time. You can be from anywhere in the world and still win if you just jump clean and quick.

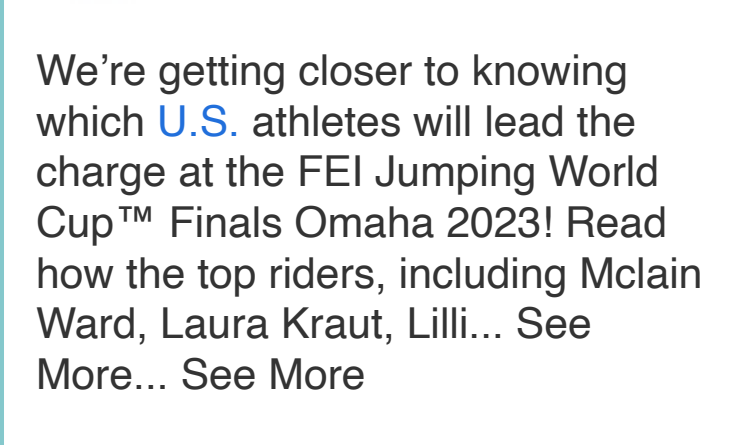
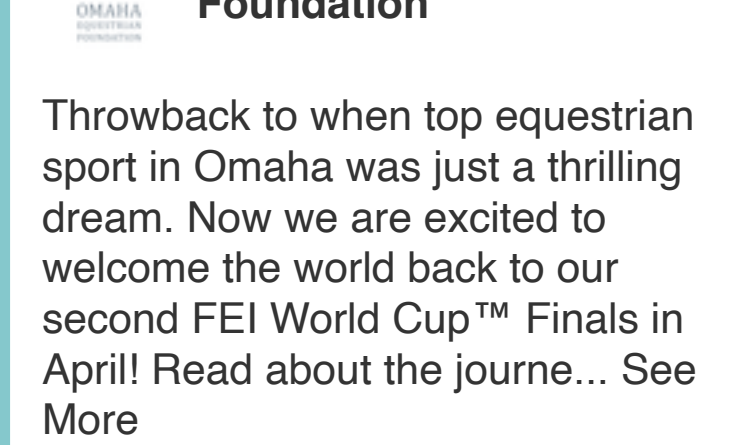
IN THE NEWS

Competition officials were announced with a list of experienced appointees, including FEI Level 4 course designer Bernardo Costa Cabral of Portugal.

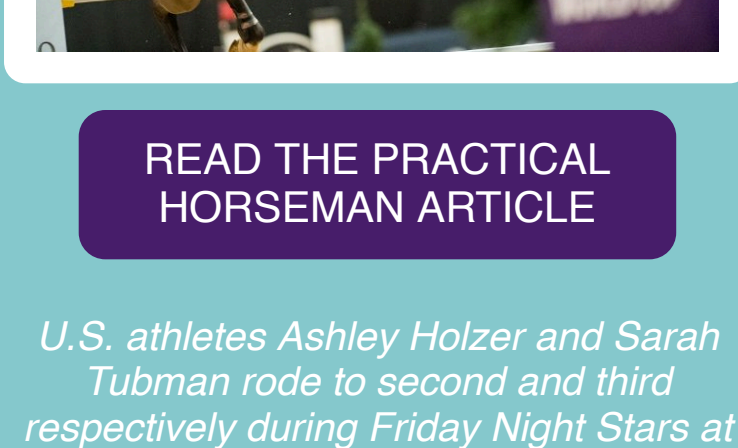

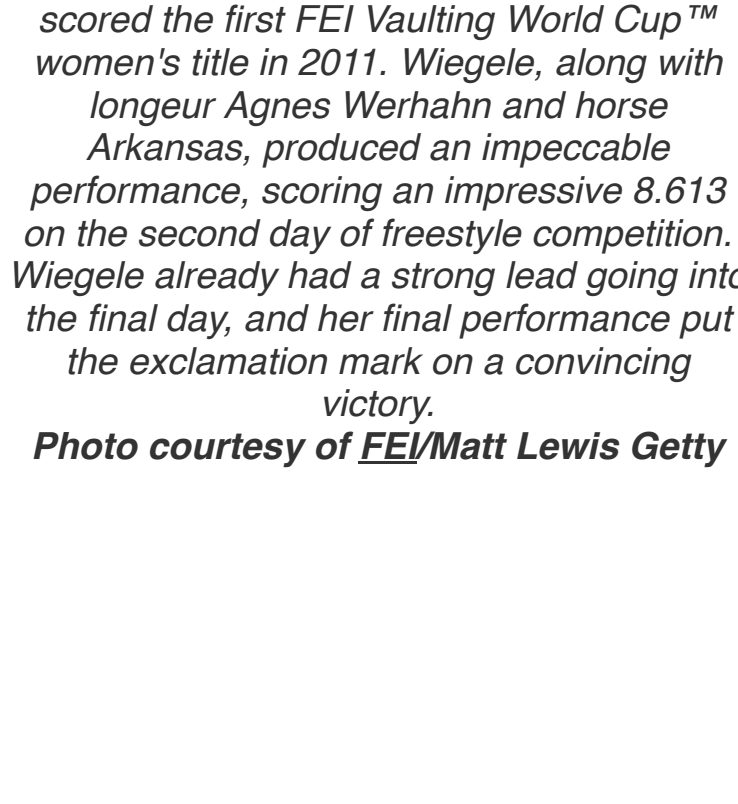
VICTORIES ON MEMORY LANE

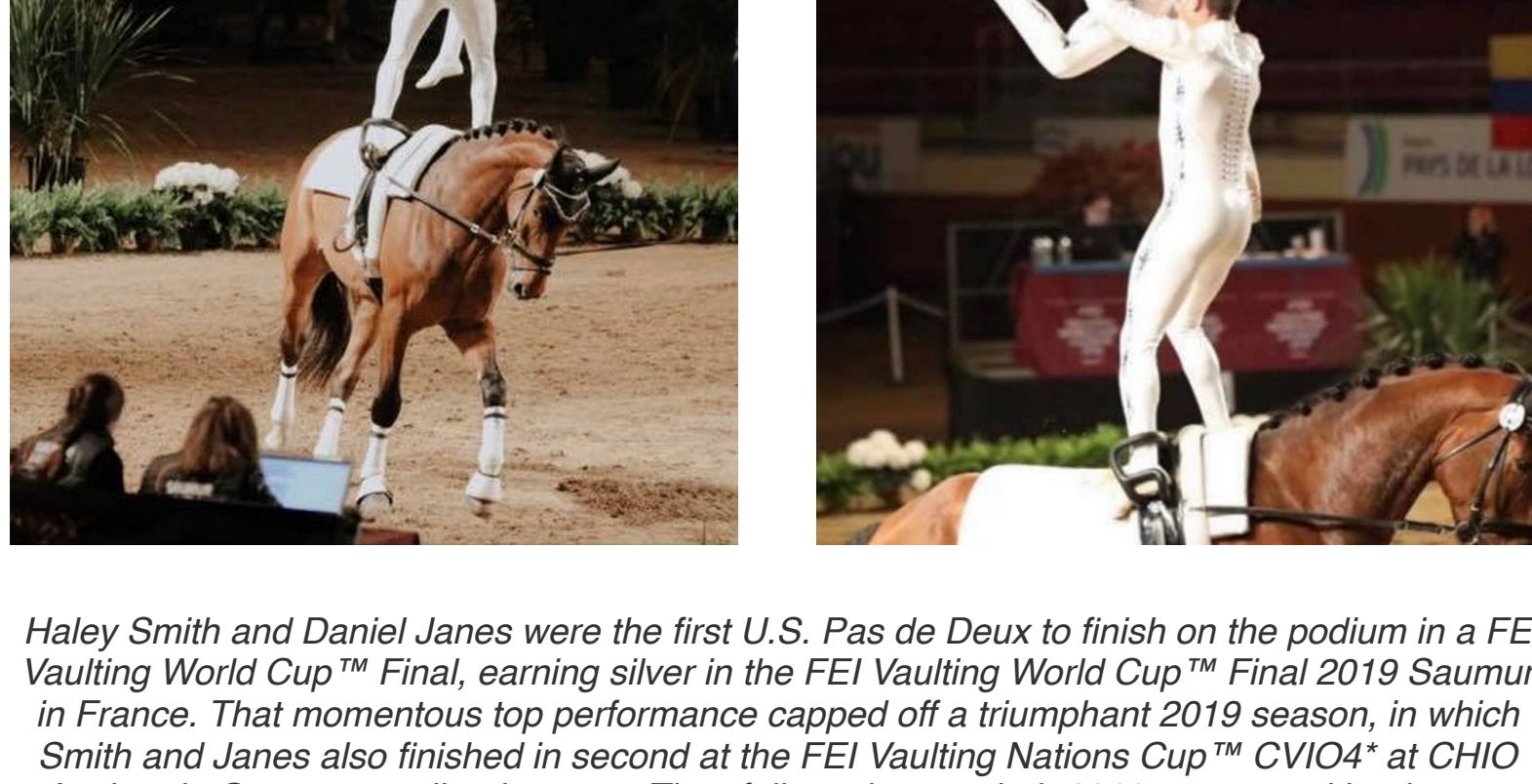


With wins in the FEI World Championships™ and FEI World Equestrian Games™, Switzerland's Patric Looser added yet another impressive title to his resume when he claimed the first male FEI Vaulting World Cup™ Final win in Leipzig, Germany, in 2011. Though he finished the first day of freestyle competition sitting in second place behind France's Nicolas Andreani, Looser's sensational performance on the final day saw him close out a commanding season on top. **Photo courtesy of FEI**

It was Germany's Simone Wiegele who scored the first FEI Vaulting World Cup™ women's title in 2011. Wiegele, along with longeur Agnes Werhahn and horse Arkansas, produced an impeccable performance, scoring an impressive 8.613 on the second day of freestyle competition. Wiegele already had a strong lead going into the final day, and her final performance put the exclamation mark on a convincing victory. **Photo courtesy of FEI/Matt Lewis Getty**



Haley Smith and Daniel Janes were the first U.S. Pas de Deux to finish on the podium in a FEI Vaulting World Cup™ Final, earning silver in the FEI Vaulting World Cup™ Final 2019 Saumur in France. That momentous top performance capped off a triumphant 2019 season, in which Smith and Janes also finished in second at the FEI Vaulting Nations Cup™ CVO4* at CHIO Aachen in Germany earlier that year. They followed up on their 2019 success with a bronze medal in the Pas de Deux at the 2021 FEI Vaulting World Championship in Budapest, Hungary.
